## DuPagePads Volunteer of the Year Awards Two Selected Out of 4,000

“What makes Gerald inspirational is his passion for service and his spirit of camaraderie,” one nominator wrote. As a site coordinator for his Church, Gerald Massie recruits and coordinates volunteers from his congregation. In addition to his clear communication style and thoughtful email reminders, Gerald often goes above and beyond when there is a need. He has done it all: covering shifts for volunteers who have

last minute emergencies, picking up clean bedding from hospitals, providing extra food when needed and scrubbing sleeping pads. Consistently serving others out of a spirit of hospitality and care, Gerald even purchases birthday cakes for participants.

14-year-old Mario helps set up the site, serves dinner, makes bag lunches for the next day and even helps move sleeping pads at the end of the season. ## Welcoming One of Our Newest Sites: The Chapel–Hinsdale

The congregation at The Chapel–Hinsdale was looking for a new service project and one congregant, Jennifer Moran, suggested DuPagePads.

“I met with leaders from the agency who took time to listen to my concerns and thoroughly addressed all of my questions,” Pastor Jeff Knitt says.

For the next three weeks Pastor Jeff brought up the possibility of The Chapel volunteering to be a site for DuPagePads Interim (Overnight) Housing Program and welcomed open dialogue from his church members. “To my surprise no one had anything negative to say. I heard ‘we should do this – this is what our faith calls us to do,’” Pastor Jeff shares.



Since The Chapel-Hinsdale has become an overnight site, they have received great feedback. “Families coming to our door say this is such a warm and welcoming place,” Jennifer says and Pastor Jeff adds, “It has been fun to see our church family rally around this mission and see the connections that occur when people come together to serve.”

## Maggie’s Story – “DuPagePads Transformed My Family”



Maggie, a mother of two, suddenly faced homelessness after her husband left them. “We could no longer afford to live on our own; my children and I began staying with friends. My kids are very active and I was afraid that we were wearing out our welcome and would soon have no place to live.”

One of Maggie’s friends had referred her to DuPagePads and Maggie worked closely with her case manager on a plan for stable housing. When an apartment became available in DuPagePads Supportive Housing program, Maggie was overjoyed.

“Prior to moving into our apartment, my kids always seemed to be upset – angry or crying. Now that we have our own home, their whole disposition has changed and they are much happier.”

Even after moving in, DuPagePads case managers continue to link program participants to resources that enable participants to remain housed and thrive.

Maggie’s youngest Casey, was 3-years-old when they moved into their apartment and was struggling with speech development. Through community partnerships, Maggie’s case manager helped enroll Casey in a special needs, full-day pre-school and kindergarten.

Maggie noticed Casey’s improvement, “Now Casey is always excited to read to me. The teachers told me Casey is often the first to raise a hand in class with the correct answer and regularly helps classmates.”

Consequently, it was decided that Casey had improved enough to attend a general education first grade classroom.

Casey is thrilled to be attending the same school as the older brother in the fall, and Maggie couldn’t be happier with Casey’s progress.

“Without my case manager’s advocacy, Casey might have fallen through the cracks in the education system. DuPagePads has helped my family overcome so many challenges and I can’t thank them enough.”
