What's Working

Coordinated Entry System

Linking families and individuals with most appropriate assistance needed to prevent and end homelessness.

The Coordinated Entry process is being used to identify and house persons with the longest lengths of homelessness, those who are most vulnerable and who have the most severe service needs. With more in-depth assessment used, this process minimizes the time a family or individuals experiences a housing crisis; links clients to the most appropriate housing intervention; and streamlines and facilitates access to appropriate housing and services (such as homeless prevention, rapid re-housing, shelter, affordable housing, and permanent supportive housing).

Permanent Supportive Housing - An Investment in Our Community


Proven to help families, individuals and veterans who face the most complex challenges who are not only homeless, but who also have very low incomes and issues that may include mental illness, substance use, and disabling health conditions to live more stable lives.

Permanent Supportive Housing in DuPage County focuses on serving individuals and families who have been homeless for

one year or longer, or three times within the last four years and have been diagnosed with a disabling health condition, mental health or substance abuse disability. The families

and individuals served in this program are unable to sustain permanent and stable living conditions without external support. This program benefits our community by providing permanent housing that helps people live more stable and productive lives and is cost effective by saving tax payers in the areas of medical, mental health and substance abuse and the criminal justice system.




Impact DuPage - Driving DuPage Forward

Who is homeless?

- People who are living in a place not meant for human habitation, in an emergency shelter, in transitional housing, or are exiting an institution from one of the previous situations after less than 90 days.
- People who are losing their primary nighttime residence, or living in a doubled up situation, and lack resources or support networks to remain in housing.
- People fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, have no other residence; and lack the resources or support for housing.



Children & Homelessness

From 2006 to 2015, the number of homeless students identified by the Illinois State Board of Education served in DuPage County has increased from 269 to 1,537.9

Access to a free and appropriate education and the ability to maintain stability in school are two of the most significant ways to decrease homelessness in the future.

- Affordable housing and support services in order to remain housed
- Jobs that pay a living wage
- Job training programs to equip for skills
- Investment in homeless prevention services to keep people in their homes
- Access to mental health δ substance abuse treatment

In FY 2015, a network of agencies committed to homelessness prevention in DuPage County distributed over \$1 million to prevent imminent homelessness and re-house those who have become homeless. Funding was pieced together by a number of sources including County, State, Federal and local charities. The need for prevention services continues to outpace resources with only 22% of requests for assistance being fulfilled.
